### **SYNOD 21 - 24.**

In 2021 The synod process throughout the world began at parish level. We had meetings where we discussed Church life under three headings: COMMUNITY - PARTICIPATION - MISSION.

Since then the process moved through national and continental phases of discussion and discernment. On 4th October the Synod moves to Rome. Part 1 in 2023 and part 2 in 2024.



Below is part of a reflection by Cardinal Vincent which helps to focus our minds on this coming phase.

In the last two years, Pope Francis has been calling us to be renewed in this mission. He wants us to rediscover our life in the Church as a communion of life with God and with one another, opened up for us through the Sacraments, those outward signs of inward grace.

Over the last two years, there have been various concerted expressions of this Synodal journey, in our parishes, in the Diocese as a whole, and at the level of the Church in every continent. Now all this comes together, in October, in a Synod of Bishops, in Rome, to assess the journey thus far and to fashion clearly the next steps to be taken. These findings can then be reviewed by us all, before a further Synod of Bishops that takes place in October 2024.

We can be clear, then, that this Synod meeting is not an ecclesiastical UN Assembly, nor a Church parliament or convention, nor a referendum on the teaching of the Church. In the words of Pope Francis, it is to be 'a grace-filled event, a process of healing guided by the Holy Spirit', a setting out on a journey 'with the Lord always coming to meet us' (Pope Francis, 10<sup>th</sup> October 2021).

## NEWS FROM THE FLOATING SHELTER:

For many years St Aidan's participated in the Croydon Churches' Floating Shelter (CCFS) which provided welcome and accommodation for homeless people in church halls during the winter months. The Covid restrictions of 2020 brought a halt to this work and government health objectives continued to make that work impossible over the subsequent two years. Now that we have returned to a more normal way of living, CCFS has been working to try to find a way of re-opening the shelter following the Covid disruption. Sadly, it has had to conclude that it is not possible to re-open and so we, at St Aidan's, will not be hosting our regular Thursday nights in November and December.

There are a number of reasons for this. Many of the churches around the borough which formerly hosted a night in their hall have had to drop out, either because of lack of volunteers or because their premises are no longer available. We explored the idea of running a shorter shelter from January to Easter and we in St Aidan's could have participated but even this was proving unlikely. Furthermore, The support of Croydon Council has always been necessary for the safe and successful running of the

shelter and the council has decided that it cannot now provide that support. The council has always in the past been closely involved in working with our guests, introducing those to us who could benefit from our welcome and helping to move them on into employment and secure accommodation. Its approach to supporting the homeless is guided now by central government strategy which is to put rough sleepers into single-room accommodation, rather than into a floating shelter, until they can be permanently housed.

Many of our volunteers will be disappointed to hear this. The support from parishioners from all the churches in Coulsdon has been generous and enthusiastic throughout the ten years of our involvement and has sparked the interest of all age groups from children and young people right through to the elderly. The CCFS will be holding its AGM shortly and discussing other ways in which we may support those on the streets in Croydon. One of these ways may well be the continuation of our support to Nightwatch through provision of sandwiches. Watch this space....

## Reflection by Archbishop John on Our Lady for October the month of the rosary.

At the root of our faith is a divine promise. It comes to us through the Mother of Jesus. She cooperated uniquely with God to bring this promise to fulfilment. 'Mary,' the Angel Gabriel said to her, 'do not be afraid.' 'You have won God's favour...you are to conceive and bear a son, and you must name him Jesus.' Sometimes our faith is strong like Mary's. But it can also be hard to believe God's promise in Jesus. We can doubt our faith, listening more to the world than to the Lord. And yet, whatever the challenges to our faith and in our life, we place ourselves in God's presence, and ask Our Lady's prayers. No matter how spiritually firm or flimsy we might feel, we continue, with Mary, as the pilgrim people of God's promise. God's promise is a person. Love, forgiveness, salvation, come in flesh and blood. Born in poverty, crucified on Calvary, raised from death on the third day to open the way to heaven. The Lord Jesus is God's promise of hope to the world. The Lord Jesus is God's promise of merciful love to you and me. Perhaps especially during this month of October, keep a rosary close at hand, in your pocket, by your bed. As we pray often through these truths of our faith, we embrace them for yourself and for those in need.

#### Gospel Matthew 21:28-32

Which of the two did the father's will?' 'The first' they said. Jesus said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you, a pattern of true righteousness, but you did not believe him, and yet the tax collectors and prostitutes did. Even after seeing that, you refused to think better of it and believe in him.'

## Priest's reference for Catholic schools. Information for parents.

When parents request a school reference from a priest they are asking the priest to verify their typical Mass attendance. For secondary schools this is normally for over a three year period; for primary schools usually a one year period.

As I priest I am uncomfortable with the expectation that I should be observing when parishioner are or are not at Mass. It is central to my ministry to call people to the Eucharist but not to monitor their response. In any case it is not practically possible for a priest to know people's Mass attendance record every Sunday over years.

This raises the question as to how a priest can give the information that parents expect of him in a way that is accurate and fair to everyone. Also, how can he support the Catholic schools in their duty to be just and fair to all families who apply for admission.

## HERE IS AN EXPLANATION OF WHAT HAPPENS HERE AT ST AIDAN'S.

We have a sign in system each weekend for a set period of time. This means that IT IS THE PARENT who creates their own attendance record NOT the priest.

## Some questions and answers may help:

## How do parents know when the signing in period begins and ends at church?

There are clear announcements made at Masses and notices placed in the newsletter over several weeks. It is not possible to be at church and miss the announcements and publicity.

## What if parents are away on holiday or absent due to illness and miss the announcement?

The announcements at Mass and in newsletters are made loud and clear over several weeks to ensure no one who is regularly attending Mass can miss the information even if they are absent for a good reason. Publicity also continues on other weekends throughout the period.

## If the 'sign in' period is only for about six months, how can that cover the three year or one year period required by schools?

It is just an indication of a pattern of attendance. E.g. if someone says they were there every week for the past year but only signed in for 10 out of 20 'sign-in weeks', clearly they have <u>disqualified themselves</u> from getting the rank of 'weekly'.

## What if parents feel that their indicated Mass attendance does not to justice to their particular situation?

They can enclose a letter to the school giving the information that they want to communicate.

## Why explain to the school and not the priest?

Because it is the schools that need to know in order to make decisions about admissions. The priest plays no part in that stage of the process. It is the schools' way of dealing with the situation if they are oversubscribed. This is necessary form their perspective in order to be fair to everyone and make sure that regular church going Catholics are not excluded.

## Are all Catholic schools oversubscribed with churchgoing Catholics?

No. You can get advice about which ones are not oversubscribed from your primary school or from your priest.

## Information concerning admissions of sibling into St Aidan's Primary School.

In recent years our primary school has become oversubscribed with regular churchgoing Catholics. This has created great pressure for places.

Please note that the admissions policy at St Aidan's School does not give preference to siblings over Mass attendance. Mass attendance comes first. It is only within each Mass attendance band that a siblings have priority. It is incumbent on parents not to allow their church attendance to falter once they get the first child into the school. No one likes to see a situation where a family ends up having to use two primary schools. Parents who take responsibility have no cause for concern.
