All Saints.

Friday 1st November is 'All Saints Day'. It is a Holy Day of Obligation which means Catholics are obliged to attend Mass. Masses begin on the evening before with the Vigil Mass 7.30pm and on Friday morning at10am.

On All Saints Day we honour all those who have reached the fullness of life in the Kingdom of Heaven. It reminds us that the 'Communion of Saints' consists not only of canonised saints but of all those who are now united with God our Father through the redeeming love of Christ, in whose risen glory they share. These include members of our family and those we have known. A 'day of obligation' means that it is a day we should attend Mass.

'All Souls Day'

Saturday 2nd November is the Commemoration of the Souls of the Faithful Departed. Mass for 'All Souls' is at 10.00am.

On this day and throughout the month of November the Church prays especially for the Souls in Purgatory. In doing so we are praying that those who have died may be purified of the effects of sin and so enter the fullness of eternal life. This is the purification that we call Purgatory.

Traditionally, the purification is symbolised by fire. It is unfortunate that this symbolism has often been misrepresented as God inflicting pain. The authentic meaning of the symbol of fire is to be found in the context of the fire of God's love which purifies.

Holy Souls Book.

During the month of November there will be a Book placed in our Church with the names of departed loved ones that you have submitted. Throughout the month a Mass will be celebrated every week and on all Souls Day for all the names in the book. Please place your list of departed loved ones in the box provided in the centre aisle of the Church.

FAQ.

If people submitted a list in previous years do they need to do a new one each year ? Yes. Composing your list of departed loved ones is part of your prayer for them and a way of bringing them to the Eucharist which is always offered for the living and the dead.

It is fine to save lists on a computer file. They can be added to each year before printing for the church book. Christian Christmas cards are now available in the church shop. They are sold in packs of tens and twenties.

Sending a Christian card at Christmas is a simple but meaningful way of witnessing to our Christian faith and the wonderful message of Christmas which is proclaimed in the Gospels.

Next weekend's second collection at Masses is for LEPRA, a charity combatting leprosy and associated diseases in the developing world. For their website go to **lepra.org.uk**

LEPRA is a charitable organisation combatting Leprocy.

Leprosy is not a disease of the past. It still exists but it is curable. It is caused by a type of bacteria called Mycobacterium leprae and can affect the skin, the peripheral nerves, mucosa of the upper respiratory tract, and the eyes. According to the <u>WHO</u>, it is a 'neglected tropical disease' (NTD) which still occurs in more than 120 countries, with more than 200 000 new cases reported every year. If left untreated, leprosy can cause disabilities.

We work in partnership with people affected by leprosy to: Improve early detection Our healthcare workers carry out active case finding (door-to-door engagement) to identify people with early symptoms and refer for treatment as soon as possible;

Lepra ensures access to treatment and care. After diagnosis, we ensure people affected have access to multidrug therapy and are supported throughout their recovery.

We promote inclusion and wellbeing. By educating communities on symptoms and dispelling myths surrounding leprosy, prejudice is lessened and people affected are more likely to be accepted by family and neighbours.

Today's readings.

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Our Scripture today invites us to worship Christ Jesus, who opens our eyes to the marvels that he has done for us as our high priest, and reveals to us the Father. The readings also assure us that our God never abandons us, even in our bondage.

First Reading. - Using tender, compassionate imagery, Jeremiah addresses the exiled people of Israel with a poem of restoration. He promises that God will bring them home again: they will be restored to their own land, and God's loving purpose will again be triumphant.

The account of the miracle in the **Gospel** reveals another type of restoration: the restoration of sight to Bartimaeus, the blind beggar at the roadside who cries out to Jesus in desperation. Not only is Bartimaeus healed and his sight restored, but he also models discipleship by following Jesus without hesitation.

In the **Second Reading** from Hebrews, the theme of restoration appears again: Christ Jesus is our compassionate high priest who restores us as daughters and sons of God.

The **Psalm** is a pilgrim song of hope and joy, reminding us of God's goodness in the past and his ongoing deliverance of his people.

This week, we pray for the eyes of our heart and mind to be opened, so that we might receive the lifegiving revelations and blessings of Jesus. We also pray for all who are living lives of bondage and slavery in our world today, and seek God's guidance as to how we can help.

Today's readings:

First Reading JEREMIAH 31:7-9 The Lord says this: Shout with joy for Jacob! Hail the chief of nations! Proclaim! Praise! Shout: 'The Lord has saved his people, the remnant of Israel!' See, I will bring them back from the land of the North and gather them from the far ends of earth; all of them: the blind and the lame, women with child, women in labour: a great company returning here. They had left in tears, I will comfort them as I lead them back; I will guide them to streams of water, by a smooth path where they will not stumble. For I am a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my first-born son.

Responsorial Psalm PSALM 125(126)

What marvels the Lord worked for us! Indeed we were glad.

When the Lord delivered Zion from bondage, it seemed like a dream. Then was our mouth filled with laughter, on our lips there were songs.

The heathens themselves said: 'What marvels the Lord worked for them!' What marvels the Lord worked for us! Indeed we were glad.

Deliver us, O Lord, from our bondage as streams in dry land. Those who are sowing in tears will sing when they reap.

They go out, they go out, full of tears, carrying seed for the sowing: they come back, they come back, full of song, carrying their sheaves.

Second Reading HEBREWS 5:1-6

Every high priest has been taken out of mankind and is appointed to act for men in their relations with God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins; and so he can sympathise with those who are ignorant or uncertain because he too lives in the limitations of weakness. That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: *You are my son, today I have become your father,* and in another text: *You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever.*

Gospel MARK 10:46-52

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
