Purley Food Hub. 4,000 December meals...2024 total tops 41,000

With huge thanks to our volunteers, donors and supporters, we provided food for just over 4,000 meals for 445 people in December - our second busiest month of the year (after August in the school summer holidays). December took our total to 41,778 meals in 2024 - our third busiest year on record.

At four of the month's seven sessions we supplied food for more than 70 people across the southern half of the borough.

And at the busiest of these, on Wednesday 18th December, clients who were due deliveries on Christmas Day and New Year's Day instead received increased food and also an Aldi gift card for £25-£70 depending on the size of the family.

Next weekend, there will be a Pastoral Letter from Archbishop John about the next phase of the 'Called to Bear Fruit' journey in the Archdiocese. The letter will introduce consultation booklets for parishioners. The booklets highlight six key themes for discussion in small groups before Sunday 6 April, by when reflections should be submitted.

Groups need not meet on parish property or require formal coordination. Instead, each group will be invited to share its reflections. He hopes this will ensure every voice is given the opportunity to be heard. The question being asked is essentially: how do we grow as communities of missionary disciples?

Readings for the Baptism of the Lord, Year C, 12th January 2025

'Here is my servant whom I uphold'

With the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we reach the end of Christmastide, and the Gospel readings begin to follow Jesus in his teaching and public mission. This feast is another 'epiphany': a manifestation of God as Father, Son and Spirit.

The **First Reading** from Isaiah is joyous. God will save his people. Like a shepherd he will care for them, and bring them home from exile.

The **Psalm** is a prayer of praise to the God of creation, who nourishes his people and pours forth his Spirit upon them.

In the **Second Reading** we are told that we have been saved through rebirth in water and the Spirit: not through any merit of our own, but thanks to the loving kindness of our God.

In the **Gospel** we hear God's voice proclaiming Jesus as his beloved Son, and the Spirit descends upon him as he is baptised by John.

As Pilgrims of Hope in this **Jubilee year**, let us consider the glories of our universe, created through and for Christ, who brings all things to perfection. Perhaps pondering on the waters of baptism will lead us to a greater and deeper appreciation of this wonderful element, and encourage us to help and pray for those deprived of life-giving water

Today's readings:

First reading

Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

Comfort, comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare is ended, that her iniquity is pardoned, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins.

A voice cries:

'In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.' Go on up to a high mountain, O Sion, herald of good news; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good news; lift it up, fear not; say to the cities of Judah, 'Behold your God!' Behold, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him: behold, his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. He will tend his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms; he will carry them in his bosom, and gently lead those that are with young.

Psalm 104(103):1b-2. 3-4. 24-25. 27-28. 29-30. R1

Bless the Lord, O my soul! My God, how great you are!

O Lord my God, how great you are, clothed in majesty and honour, wrapped in light as with a robe! You stretch out the heavens like a tent.

On the waters you lay the foundation for your dwelling. You make the clouds your chariot; you ride on the wings of the wind. You make the winds your messengers, flame and fire your servants.

How many are your works, O Lord! In wisdom you have made them all. The earth is full of your creatures. Vast and wide is the span of the sea, with its creeping things past counting, living things great and small.

All of these look to you to give them their food in due season. You give it, they gather it up; you open wide your hand, they are well filled.

You hide your face, they are dismayed; you take away their breath, they die, returning to the dust from which they came. You send forth your spirit, and they are created, and you renew the face of the earth.

Second reading Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7

Beloved: The grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live selfcontrolled, upright, and godly lives in the present age, waiting for our blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Saviour Jesus Christ, who gave himself for us to redeem us from all lawlessness, and to purify for himself a people for his own possession who are zealous for good works. But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Saviour appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Saviour, so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

Gospel Luke 3:15-16, 21-22

At that time: As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Christ, John answered them all, saying, 'I baptise you with water, but he who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire.'

Now when all the people were baptised by John the Baptist and when Jesus also had been baptised and was praying, the heavens were opened, and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form, like a dove; and a voice came from heaven, 'You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.'
