#### Called to Bear Fruit

At Mass last weekend, we heard a pastoral letter from The Archbishop of Southwark outlining the Archdiocese's renewal process. We were invited to read about the 'Called to Bear Fruit' process which asks parishes to share their own experiences, reflect on issues affecting our parish and suggest solutions that can be fed back to the Archdiocese.

The Parish Pastoral Council met this last week and discussed how we can take this process forward here at St Aidan's. We would like to invite all Parishioners to participate over the next few weeks in small discussion groups to address the themes outlined in the Consultation document. This will involve a short series of group gatherings, each lasting about an hour between now and the end of March. These meetings may be in someone's home, on Church premises or even online at a time to suit your availability. The Parish Council is willing to help coordinate the groups.

This is a diocesan exercise but we hope that this might enable our Parish to focus on what we want and need from each other and that we might be able to identify opportunities for parish communities to work effectively together.

A member of the PPC will speak at each mass this weekend, and will be calling for volunteers to join with us to work through Archbishop John's themes together over the next few weeks.

#### Todays readings.

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This 'Sunday of the Word of God' celebrates the gift of Scripture, encouraging us to listen to and live by God's word. In two of the readings, the word of God is proclaimed publicly to the people.

The Jewish people, recently returned from captivity, listen attentively as the high priest Ezra reads from the Book of the Law (**First Reading**). Ezra then helps them to understand what they hear. Though moved to tears, he bids them rejoice: 'for the joy of the Lord is your strength'.

In the **Gospel**, Jesus reads from the prophet Isaiah when he reaches the synagogue at Nazareth, his hometown. He sets before the people a new way of life, announcing that he is God's anointed one. His mission is to bring good news to the poor, proclaiming liberty to captives and freeing the downtrodden.

Paul (**Second Reading**) uses the image of the body to explain how we are joined together through the Spirit at our own baptism to form the body of Christ. Just as each part has a unique function, each person's gifts and responsibilities are needed and respected.

The **Psalm** highlights the beauty of God's law, providing guidance, refreshing the soul and bringing joy to the heart.

As Pilgrims of Hope in this **Jubilee Year**, we pray for all who long for joy and refreshment, especially the oppressed and those caught up in modern-day slavery. We give thanks for the generosity and courage of all who work to support and liberate those held captive.

#### ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING & MODERN SLAVERY

St Mary's RC Church, 70 Wellesley Road Croydon, CR0 2AR Wednesday, 29 January 2025 6.30pm-8.30pm. The evening will focus on the work of the Santa Marta Group and how the Church is working to combat these crimes and support victims.

#### **Today's readings:**

#### First reading Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

In those days: Ezra the priest brought the Law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could understand what they heard, on the first day of the seventh month. And he read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand. And the ears of all the people were attentive to the Book of the Law.

And Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden platform that they had made for the purpose. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was above all the people, and as he opened it, all the people stood. And Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people answered, 'Amen, Amen,' lifting up their hands. And they bowed their heads and worshipped the LORD with their faces to the ground. Ezra and the Levites read from the book, from the Law of God, clearly, and they gave the meaning, so that the people understood the reading.

And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, 'This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep.' For all the people wept as they heard the words of the Law. Then he said to them, 'Go on your way. Eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions to anyone who has nothing ready, for this day is holy to our Lord. And do not be grieved, for the joy of the LORD is your strength.'

#### Ps 19(18):8. 9. 10. 15. R John 6:63c

Your words, O Lord, are spirit and life.

The law of the LORD is perfect; it revives the soul.
The decrees of the LORD are steadfast; they give wisdom to the simple.

The precepts of the LORD are right; they gladden the heart.
The command of the LORD is clear; it gives light to the eyes.

The fear of the LORD is pure, abiding for ever.
The judgements of the LORD are true; they are, all of them, just.

May the spoken words of my mouth, the thoughts of my heart, win favour in your sight, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer!

#### Second reading 1 Corinthians 12:12-30

Brothers and Sisters: Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptised into one body — Jews or Greeks, slaves or free — and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

For the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot should say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear should say,

'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, yet one body.

The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and on those parts of the body that we think less honourable we bestow the greater honour, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honour to the part that lacked it, that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the Church first Apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret?

#### Gospel Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

Inasmuch as many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the things that have been accomplished among us, just as those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word have delivered them to us, it seemed good to me also, having followed all things closely for some time past, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, that you may have certainty concerning the things you have been taught.

At that time: Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit to Galilee, and a report about him went out through all the surrounding country. And he taught in their synagogues, being glorified by all.

And he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. And as was his custom, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and he stood up to read. And the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll, and found the place where it was written, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.'

And he rolled up the scroll, and gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. And the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. And he began to say to them, 'Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.'
