The month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The symbol of the 'Sacred Heart' has an important place in Catholic spirituality. It was highlighted in the seventeenth century when a French nun, Sr. Margaret Mary, received a vision of Christ with flames of love coming from his heart. In describing the apparition Margaret Mary said, "The divine heart was represented to me, ... and the wound which Jesus received on the cross appeared there visibly". It is important to remember that Margaret Mary's vision has its origin in the scriptures and is highlighted particularly by St. John's Gospel, "From his heart shall flow fountains of living water". Jn. 7:38 The month of June has traditionally been a time of renewing devotion to the Sacred Heart. It was literally on the cross that he was pierced with a lance "and immediately there came out blood and water" Jn 19:34. Friday 27 June is the feast of the Sacred Heart.

Commentary on today's readings - with Dom Henry Wansbrough OSB.

First reading Acts 7:55-60

Stephen publicly declared his faith in Christ, and his death echoes that of Jesus. He saw the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God, just as Jesus prophesied that his judges would see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of God. The final prayers of Stephen, committing his spirit to the Lord Jesus and forgiving his killers, echo those of Jesus himself on Calvary. The account therefore shows that Christian martyrdom echoes the death of Christ himself.

Second reading Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, 20.

There are some passages in scripture which contain so much in them that a commentary is superfluous and even a little impertinent. Here is one example. This reading belongs to the final Sunday of Eastertide, the season which celebrated the Redemption, the hinge of history. It belongs to Year C, the final year of the three-year cycle. It is the final passage of the final book of the Bible.

The way to know what this passage, is saying, and how it pulls together the threads of the Apocalypse, the Bible and the whole sweep of salvation history, is not to intellectualize it. It should not be read or studied as some kind of specimen. It should be proclaimed. Go into a private room if you want – or out on a balcony – or on a hilltop miles from anywhere – and read this passage out loud, as loudly as you can. If you don't want to embarrass yourself, wait until no-one is passing by. Don't worry about mere people: tell the sky and tell the stars. Tell the universe.

Gospel John 17:20-26

In this final part of the high priestly prayer of Jesus, he suddenly turns from concern for the circle of his disciples to concern for the wider circle of future disciples, and prays for their unity. The unity of the disciples was to be a sign not only horizontally, a sign of their love for one another, but also vertically, a sign of the love of Jesus for them and the mutual love of Jesus and the Father. It was to be a sign for the world, 'that the world may believe that you sent me'.

There is a story that in extreme old age the Apostle John would be carried into the Christian assembly and asked to give them a saving message. All he would say was, 'Love one another'. And at the early martyrdoms the spectators would say, 'See how these Christians love one another!'

Already the Letter of John, especially 2 and 3 John, show that Christian unity was not flawless. The scandals of Christian disunity have become flagrant since the break between Eastern and Western Christianity in 1054 and the shattering of Western Christianity into increasingly petty fragments since 1517. Mission to non-Christians has in the last century or so shown the counterproductive absurdity of this disunity, but the priority given by the Churches to this sign of Jesus' message remains far below that of their Founder. A scatter of quarrelling sects is hardly an effective sign of divine love.

Acts 7:55-60

In those days: Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. And he said, 'Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.' But they cried out with a loud voice and stopped their ears and rushed together at him. Then they cast him out of the city and stoned him. And the witnesses laid down their garments at the feet of a young man named Saul. And as they were stoning Stephen, he called out, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' And falling to his knees he cried out with a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.' And when he had said this, he fell asleep

Second reading Rev 22:12-14, 16-17, 20

Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end.' Blessed are those who wash their robes, so that they may have the right to the tree of life and that they may enter the city by the gates.

'I, Jesus, have sent my angel to testify to you about these things for the churches. I am the root and the descendant of David, the bright morning star.'

The Spirit and the Bride say, 'Come.' And let the one who hears say, 'Come.' And let the one who is thirsty come; let the one who desires take the water of life without price.

He who testifies to these things says, 'Surely I am coming soon.' Amen. Come, Lord Jesus!

Gospel John 17:20-26

At that time: Jesus lifted up his eyes to heaven, and praying said, '[Holy Father,] I do not ask for these only, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given to them, that they may be one even as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become perfectly one, so that the world may know that you sent me and loved them even as you loved me. Father, I desire that they also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory that you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world. O righteous Father, even though the world does not know you, I know you, and these know that you have sent me. I made known to them your name, and I will continue to make it known, that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them.'
